Among the AOCs, **Muhammad Yusuf** stands out as a role model. With extensive experience in the BIAS program, Yusuf has long been involved in ensuring extensive. Previously, he worked alongside the Health Office and community health centers to conduct monitoring, ensuring seamless coordination between healthcare institutions and schools.

However, at that time, the program mainly focused on formal coordination, without the presence of agents of change like today. Yusuf realized that this approach was not able to reach hard-to-access community groups, so he chose to become an AOC. Through his new role, Yusuf not only ensures program implementation but also brings a personal approach, bridging direct communication with communities.

His dedication has paved the way for a Community Learning Activity Center (PKBM) in his community, which had not benefited from immunization programs for 20 years. With his patience and persistence, Yusuf managed to convince parents at the Community Learning Activity Center that immunization is the best protection for their children. Now, for the first time, the BIAS program with the support of Jalin Foundation is available at the Community Learning Activity Center – an achievement that we can all be proud of.


